WINTER SAILS 2nd and 4th Sundays through mid-March




All sailing events are held in compliance with county and state COVID-19 restrictions. Boats must be single-handed, or sailed with members from the same household. Sign-up online.


CALL FOR COMMITTEE MEMBERS

THE BEST SAILING/RACING MOVIES to STREAM

Rainy winter days coupled with being stuck at home, it really is enough to make you miss sailing. We were one of the lucky clubs in that we were still able to make our racing season materialize in spite of the pandemic. If you are looking to cure the winter blahs, and you long for the thrill of the race, here are a handful of recommendations for movies about yacht racing.

**Morning Light (2008)*

Fifteen young sailors compete for 11 spots on the TransPac racing boat. This documentary tells the story of a group of intrepid and determined young men and women, on the cusp of adulthood, as they embark on life's first great adventure. Racing a high-performance 52-foot sloop in the TRANSPAC, the most revered of open-ocean sailing competitions, the crew of "Morning Light" matches wits and skills in a dramatic 2300 mile showdown against top professionals.

*Wind (1992)

Best described as "Top Gun meets the America's Cup," *Wind* tells the fictionalized story of a US sailor who wants to reclaim the cup from the Aussis. In 1983, yacht sailor Will Parker (Matthew Modine) leads an American crew financed by millionaire Morgan Weld (Cliff Robertson) to defeat during the America's Cup race against an Australian crew. Determined to get the prize back, Will convinces Morgan to finance an experimental boat designed by his ex-girlfriend Kate's (Jennifer Grey) new beau, Joe Heisler (Stellan Skarsgard). When the boat is completed, the Americans head to Australia to reclaim the cup.

*Turning Tide (En Solitaire) (2013)

A racer's attempt at the Vendée Globe gets slightly sidelined when he has to stop in the Canary Islands for repairs and winds up with a stowaway aboard. Threatened with disqualification if the stowaway is discovered, skipper Yann Kermadec must grapple with lying to his shore team while also handling the pressures of the race. (In French with English subtitles)

*Maiden (2018)

The documentary tells the story of the first all-female team in the 1989-90 Whitbread Around-the-World race. A combination of chase-boat footage, original news footage, as well as on-boat cameras make this film almost as good as racing the real thing...without getting seasick.
